Dear Friends,

I joined the student staff of the New Jersey Folk Festival three years ago after taking a folklore class with its founder and director, Dr. Angus Kress Gillespie. I enrolled in that class not because I had a desire to learn how folklore was used to express the trials and tribulations of a cultural or occupational group, but because I wanted a fun class that would fill a graduation requirement. As a science major, I had only a limited exposure to the humanities and even less to its importance in our society. In my eyes, music, stories and art served only to entertain. When Dr. Gillespie asked me to join the staff, I thought it would provide me with practical internship skills that we in the sciences do not often get—I had no concept of the significance of the festival itself. That changed when our festival class began. The year I joined, the festival was featuring the Garifuna, a small cultural group based out of Central America. Through a combination of lectures and guest speakers, I learned how both the culture and language of the Garifuna was dying out, especially in the United States where younger generations had little opportunity to learn the language and customs of their ancestors. The Garifuna musicians, dancers and demonstrators that we were featuring at our festival were determined to change that. The art and material culture that they produced was not just a way to keep one another entertained—it defined the history of their people; the challenges that they had to overcome in order to create better lives for their children. Their culture represented their origins and who they were as individuals, and our festival was a way to keep that alive. On festival day, I witnessed firsthand the joy that these individuals experienced in seeing such an important aspect of their lives put forth into the eye of the public for the first time. This was truly an extraordinary moment for me, and it is the reason that I am writing this letter as Festival Manager today.

Established in 1975, the New Jersey Folk Festival is the oldest continuously run folk festival in our state, and its mission to preserve and protect the traditions that make New Jersey so richly diverse is one of utmost importance. We, as a student staff of fourteen Rutgers undergraduates, are responsible for continuing this mission. Under the direction of Professor Gillespie and our Associate Director, Matthew Hueston, our team has worked tirelessly throughout the year to put the festival together. This year our staff is proud to celebrate Maritime folk culture. Being a coastal state, New Jersey has a rich history of Maritime folk customs, stories, music and art that we will be highlighting at our stages and Heritage Area this year. We are also proud to honor Dr. Simon J. Bronner, founder of the Pennsylvania Center for Culture Studies, as our Lifetime Achievement Award winner. Through his dedication to teaching and his many award-winning publications, he has made vast contributions to the fields of both folklore and folklife. The role of Festival Manager requires confidence in one's ability to lead a group that I did not think I possessed going into the job. It is because of the support and encouragement of our returning staff members and the positive, hardworking attitudes of our new members that I was able to find this confidence within myself, and I would like to express my sincere appreciation to every single one of them. I would also like to thank all of the volunteers who make our event possible each year. The festival has not just been a valuable part of my undergraduate education—it has been an avenue into personal growth that I will take with me for the rest of my life. It represents Rutgers' mission of global reach and Jersey roots like nothing else that I have experienced here, and I am proud to have been a part of it for all these years.

40-Year History of The Festival

A Student Run Event



The Festival is one of its kind and caliber in the US managed by Rutgers undergraduate students. The staff is responsible for continuing the Festival's mission of celebrating the multicultural folk life of NJ and the region.

In 1975, when the Festival first started, only two students were involved in its organization and management. Today, fifteen students work together as specialized coordinators to present all the music, food, crafts, and demonstrations that you see on the field.

The class meets for three hours once a week under the direction of founder Dr. Angus Gillespie and Assistant Director, Matt Hueston. The first half of the class includes lessons about the development of folk music and crafts, performer histories, relevant skills like writing press releases, and intricate production facets of the Festival. The second half functions as a business meeting run by the Festival Manager.



Established in 1975, the New Jersey Folk Festival is an annual, FREE, non-profit family event, and the oldest continuously-run folk festival in the state. Managed by undergraduate students at Rutgers, the State University, in New Brunswick, the Festival is held on the grounds of the Eagleton Institute on the Douglass Campus, always on the last Saturday of April, rain or shine. Each year the Festival attracts more than 15,000 people and is one of the City of New Brunswick's largest regularly-scheduled events.

The mission of the New Jersey Folk Festival is to preserve, defend, and protect the music, culture, and arts of New Jersey. Therefore, the primary focus of the New Jersey Folk Festival is the traditional music, crafts, and foods of the diverse ethnic and cultural communities within New Jersey and its surrounding region. Typically, the event features four stages of music, dance, and workshops, a juried craft market, a children's activities area, a delicious array of food choices that offer everything from hamburgers, vegetarian fare, and funnel cake to a wide variety of ethnic foods, a folk music marketplace, and a heritage area which offers a close-up look at each year's ethnic or geographical theme or other appropriate exhibits.

Each year the Festival strives for diversity in selecting performers, not only seeking out traditional "American" artists, but also reaching out via fieldwork to the many ethnic communities found within New Jersey. The annual ethnic or regional feature contributes an essential intimate connection to these varied cultural groups represented in the state's population.

The New Jersey Folk Festival is professionally supervised by its Founder and Executive Director, Dr. Angus Kress Gillespie, and by its Associate Director, Matt Hueston, a former NJFF staff member and Rutgers University alumni. The Festival is proud to be a major part of Rutgers Day.

Awards and Honorees

Lifetime Achievement Award

Simon J. Bronner is the recipient of the New Jersey Folk Festival's Lifetime Achievement Award for 2015. We believe he is extremely deserving of this award due to his immense contributions to the field of Folklife and beyond.

Simon Bronner was born 7, 1954 in Haifa, Israel and spent his childhood in Chicago and New York City. He went on to pursue an undergraduate degree was in political science, history, and folklore at Binghamton University (B.A., 1974), before receiving his M.A. in American Folk Culture at the Cooperstown Graduate Program of the State University of New York (1977). He then worked for the New York State Historical Association as director of the Archive of New York State Folklife in Cooperstown. Dr. Bronner then completed his Ph.D. in Folklore and American Studies (1981) and worked for the Indiana University Museum of History, Anthropology, and Folklore, and was assistant to Richard M. Dorson on the Journal of the Folklore Institute.

His teaching career began as an assistant professor of American Studies and folklore at the Pennsylvania State University at Harrisburg, and was promoted to the rank of Distinguished University Professor in 1991. While at Penn State he was founded the Center for Pennsylvania Culture Studies at the Pennsylvania State University, Harrisburg, served as Coordinator of the American Studies Program at the college from 1987 to 2002, and was the founding director of the college's doctoral program in American Studies in 2008. He has also taught as Walt Whitman Distinguished Chair in American Cultural Studies at Leiden University in the Netherlands (2006), Visiting Professor of Folklore and the History of American Civilization at Harvard University (1997–1998), Fulbright Professor of American Studies at Osaka University in Japan (1996–1997), and Visiting Distinguished Professor of American Studies at the University of California at Davis (1991).

Dr. Bronner has received many awards for his work both in education and writing, including the Mary Turpie Prize from the American Studies Association in recognition of his program building, teaching, and advising in 1999, Peter and Iona Opie Prize for best book on children's folklore in 1990 for his book *American Children's Folklore*, and multiple awards for his editing of the *Encyclopedia of American Folklife*. In addition to these, he has published and contributed to many other books on a wide variety of topics ranging from Jewish Studies, Material Culture, Folklife, and American History.



Awards and Honorees

Grand Marshall

Paul Hart joined the Tuckerton Seaport as Deputy Director in July 2007 bringing with him valuable experience in education, history and the arts. In 2009 he became the Executive Director of the Seaport. Mr. Hart has earned his B.A. and Masters Degrees from Montclair College. He was an educator, supervisor and principal in the public school system. He was also a Clinical Instructor at Kean University.

He is currently an adjunct instructor at Brookdale Community College. Paul was the leader in securing a \$10,000 grant from the NEH for the establishment of a History Museum at The William R Satz School. The grant funded the creation of "The Decades Museum" which changes its exhibits monthly to match the Social Studies curriculum.

Paul has served on several boards including the Monmouth County Arts Council Education Committee and the Holmdel Theater Company. He has also been the Collections Manager for the Stafford Township Historical Society for ten years.



Awards and Honorees

Honorary Grand Marshal

Isha Vyas is Division Head at the Middlesex County Cultural and Heritage Commission, responsible for all arts, history and cultural programs and development including education, grants, fiscal integrity and community relations. She has designed and implemented significant projects for almost fifteen years, many of landmark importance. She has developed and established significant partnerships with institutions such as the Smithsonian's Anacostia Community Museum, Washington DC; the National Museum of the American Indian-George Gustav Heye Center, New York City; Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey; and Newark Museum, among others. Prior to the Commission, she worked in finance in New York City and has several years of corporate management experience. Recipient of many community service awards, Ms. Vyas has served on the boards of many organizations, most recently a member of the New Jersey State and Historical Records Board, treasurer of the Association of County Cultural & Heritage Agencies, member of Advocates for New Jersey History and a trustee of one of the largest libraries in Middlesex County.



Deputy Grand Marshal

Timothy Hart was named Executive Director of Tuckerton Seaport in December 2006 and as of 2009 became the Deputy Director. Mr. Hart is currently serving as the Director of the Ocean County Cultural and Heritage Commission. Additionally he serves on the Board of Trustees of the Ocean County Historical Society, and the Ocean County Roundtable of the Revolution. In addition to being Director of the Ocean County Cultural and Heritage Commission, Mr. Hart is also active in the Stafford Township Historical Society, where he has been involved with all facets of preserving and interpreting the history of the town.



Over the years, he has made a number of contributions to the town of Tuckerton and its preservation of history. He worked on preserving a number of historical sites such as the Manahawkin Train Station and the Old Manahawkin Baptist Church.

In addition, he owns and operates Hart Electric, an electrical contracting business. Mr. Hart also holds a law degree from Rutgers University and earned his bachelors degree from Georgetown University in Washington, D.C. A native of Southern Ocean County, Mr. Hart was born and raised in Stafford, where he resides today.

Awards and Honorees

Honorary Director

Richard V. Ehlert had two older brothers who served in the U.S. Army during World War II, but he enlisted in the Navy. Ehlert was assigned as a diesel engine technician on LST-495, a Landing Ship Tank. LST was the naval designation for vessels created during World War II to support amphibious operations by carrying vehicles, cargo, and landing troops directly onto an unimproved shore.

Ehlert served with that ship in the European Theater for the Invasion of Normandy, from June 6 to June 25, 1944. His ship would reach the beach under heavy enemy fire, open the bay doors in the bow, open the ramp, and roll off the equipment. His ship made seven trips to Omaha Beach, delivering crucial large equipment and guns.

Later he served with that ship for Invasion of Southern France from August 15 to September 25, 1944. Still later, his ship sailed through the Panama Canal to reach the Pacific Ocean. There he participated in the assault and occupation of Okinawa in the Pacific Theater from April 29 to June 24, 1945. His ship was also on hand for the formal ceremony of Japanese



Honorary Chairman

The Reverend David M. Rider is the President and Executive Director of the Seamen's Church Institute of New York and New Jersey (SCI). This organization embraces a crucial, three-fold mission to provide pastoral care to mariners, advocate for seafarers' rights, and conduct maritime education.

Founded in 1834 and affiliated with the Episcopal Church, SCI is the largest, most comprehensive mariners' agency in North America, according to the release. Annually, its chaplains visit 3,400 vessels in the Port of New York and New Jersey and along 2,200 miles of America's inland waterways. SCI's maritime education program provides navigational training to nearly 1,600 mariners each year at simulator-based facilities located in Houston, Texas, and Paducah, Kentucky. SCI and its maritime attorneys are recognized as leading advocates for merchant mariners by the U.S. government as well as the United Nations, the International Maritime Organization, the International Labor Organization, and maritime trade associations. Rider spent ten years with the Episcopal Church's Church Pension Group, where he served as managing trustee of the Episcopal Church Medical Trust and senior vice president (Claims) of the Church Insurance Company. Rider has also served as interim leader of two large Episcopal Churches, Grace Church in New York City and St. Mark's Church, New Canaan, Connecticut.



Heritage Spotlight

Welcome to the Heritage Area at the 41st Annual New Jersey Folk Festival!

The 2015 edition of the NJFF will focus on martime folklife. We plan to present the traditional cultural expressions of such groups as seafarers, fishermen, longshoremen, boatbuilders, and seafood processors. We will work with communities located near oceans, bays, or lakes, whose residents have a strong cultural relationship with the water. Maritime folklore encompasses a wide range of genres, including custom and ritual, legend, narrative, language, jargon, and song, as well as folklife forms such as technical skill, foodways, and material culture.

A special focus of this year's festival will be revival performances of sea shanties. These were the work songs of the square-rigger days. Without them, many a fine, tall clipper ship would not have sailed serenely into port. "A shanty," one old sailor said, "is another hand on the rope." Hauling away on the ropes was but one of the forms of backbreaking sea labor that these songs served to time and enliven. In addition to the sea shanties, we will feature traditional deep-water songs that were sung not for work, but for entertainment. Typically in the watch from 6:00 to 8:00 pm, the men would gather in clear weather around one of the hatches, where there would be singing and dancing of the jig and hornpipe. There were many kinds of songs that were popular at sea, including songs of famous vessels, ballads of sea fights and piracy, as well as songs of adventures ashore in Sailor Town.

Randy Budd

Randy Budd, 53, is a carpenter from West Creek, New Jersey, located in southern Ocean County. After surfing for some forty years, he began building surfboards in 2008. He chose wood over foam as his medium because it is more traditional and because he was familiar with it. And, as he explains, wood is “way cooler looking.” Various construction methods are used to hollow the inside of the surfboard and lighten the weight of the completed board. The main inspiration, apart from beauty, is that this is a more environmentally friendly method. Currently, Randy makes hollow wooden surfboards, handplanes for body surfing, and traditional Hawaiian alaias. He told us, “I really enjoy what I do, making boards, teaching the craft, and meeting people.”



Mary May

Ka Hlaw Meh

Ka Hlaw Meh's story of struggle and survival begins in 1996 in a small village in the Kayah State in Burma. The Karenni community has long sought independence from the military rule of the Burmese generals. After she and her family fled their village by foot, in a refugee camp Ka Hlaw acquired a new skill: weaving cotton yarn into fabric on a traditional “back-strap loom.” Apart from their traditional skirts and blouses, she weaves bags that may be carried over the shoulder or slung across the chest. She developed a keen eye for color and ability to weave English and Karenni letters into her work. She is now using traditional methods to create contemporary items such as wristlets, cell phone holders, tote bags, and scarves.

Thomas Schnoor

Thomas W. Schnoor is a 4th generation Belford; Pound Fisherman. His Great Grandfather Jacob Schnoor founded Schnoor Fisheries in 1888 after immigrating here from Germany. Tommy took over the business from his Grandfather Otto Schnoor in 1980 at 18 and continues to pound fish till this day on his boat, the Tara Lynn. Tommy has allowed access to the scientist of the James J Howard Marine Science Labs on Sandy Hook for research and has provided live fish to the Camden Aquarium upon it's opening. Tommy served as President of the Belford Fishing Co Op for 2 years in his early 20's. Tommy hopes to continue to Pound Fish as long as possible or until State Regulations put him out of business. Tom has gone from fishing 4-5 traps per year to just 1 and from employing 4 deckhands to only 1 now, due to these regulations.



Skip Deckman



Skip Deckman has lived in Tuckerton for forty years, and frequents the woods and bays of South Jersey. Out of necessity, he and his son began making crab traps and bait keepers for their own use, and then began marketing them through his bait shop The Chum Bucket in West Creek, NJ, which he owned for seven years. Skip makes both recreational and commercial crab traps, and teaches classes in constructing the traps at Tuckerton Seaport.

Ron Spodofora

Ron Spodofora is a Barnegat Bay boat builder specializing in traditional sneakboxes and garveys. Ron spent his career building wooden roller coasters for Great Adventure, and upon his retirement became an apprentice of master boat builder Gus Heinrichs. He took over Perrine's Boatworks at Tuckerton Seaport following Heinrichs' death. In addition to demonstrating boatbuilding techniques, Ron also teaches classes for both youth and adults, including the popular Family Garvey program, an instructor in the "Voices of the Barnegat Bay" school outreach program, and a member of the Jersey Shore Folklife Center's Advisory Board.



Heritage Exhibitors

Carl Tarnow

Carl Tarnow of Belford, NJ is a fourth generation retired commercial fisherman who clammed and fished pound net traps on the Raritan and Sandy Hook Bays. Carl Tarnow's family ran their own seafood-packing house in Belford and he represented the area as a member of the Shellfish Council for several years. Carl Tarnow designed and maintains the model pound net maze at Tuckerton Seaport and is a valued speaker on pound net traditions. Carl Tarnow represented New Jersey commercial fishing traditions at the Smithsonian Folklife Festival and the Long Island Traditions Folklife Festival.



Chief Mark Gould & Justice John Norwood



Mark "Quiet Hawk" Gould is known among his people, the Nanticoke Lenni-Lenape Indian Tribe of New Jersey, as a leader who launched a modern-day re-organization of the ancient tribe. Chief Gould works to improve opportunities for tribal citizens, and believes in preserving the tribe's traditional culture, customs, and values. He is a native craftsman, a traditional dancer, an outdoorsman, and a grandfather.



Rev. John R. Norwood, Jr., an ordained Christian clergyman, is in his 10th year as an elected Tribal Councilman, is the first Principal Justice of the Tribal Supreme Court, and minister to the tribal Christian Prayer Circle Fellowship Ministry. John "Smiling-Thunderbear" Norwood is the tribal delegate to the National Congress of American Indians, the oldest and largest national organization of tribal governments in the country.

Andrew Tonnesen

Andrew Tonnesen is a student at Stockton University, studying Environmental Science with a concentration in Fish and Wildlife Management. He began carving in 2006, under the tutelage of master carver Malcolm Robinson. Upon graduating from Tuckerton Seaport's Youth Carving Club, Andrew began teaching classes to club members, and he will be teaching an adult class at the Seaport this spring. He is trying to carry on the traditional decoy carving through various styles and influences, and he concentrates on gunning style decoys and folk art. He says "I try to put my own style in my decoys to portray myself in my work."

Roger Deitz is a notable and extremely talented folk musician. He is known for performing his music on the guitar and banjo for large crowds at Philadelphia Folk Festival, Long Island Folk Festival, and the World Hunger Year Hungerthon concerts. He is also a writer, humorist, and raconteur. He has written music for over thirty years, and is a regular contributor to magazines such as *Sing Out!*, *Frets*, *Fast Folk*, *Acoustic Guitar*, and *Billboard*. He has also authored a book titled *The Folk Music Chronicles*. As a mentor, he guided many folk performers through teach-ins and articles. In 2012 he was the recipient of the New Jersey Folk Festival's Lifetime Achievement Award for his distinguished contributions to the folk music of New Jersey.

With a reputation for intimate performances and interactive fun, songs of **Spook Handy** range from the spiritual to the political. Describing Spook's music is not easy—lyrical wit of John Prine, the humor of Arlo Guthrie, the sincerity of John Denver, the boldness of Bob Dylan and the courage of Pete Seeger—emerge as a cohesive sound full of hope and promise. Spook has won several awards for his music and has performed at many prestigious folk festivals across the country. Spook is regarded as one of New Jersey's torch carriers for folk music and singer/songwriter traditions.



The Idiot Brigade is a fun, high-energy bluegrass group based in New York City. They are comprised of five members, with Margaret-Desiree Mug on dog house bass, Christian Apuzzo on guitar, Sam Merwin on wicked mandolin, Cole Quest Rotante on mandolin and dobro, Ethan Joseph on the best fiddle in NYC, and everyone pitching in on vocals. As the group says, "NYC Bluegrass and Booze!! It's good for what ails ya."

Hoot and Holler, is born from the love of American folk, nurtured from Boston's burgeoning string music scene, and inspired by the authenticity of the enduring spirit of traditional Appalachian mountain music. Their tender harmonizing on original songs comes across as simple, honest, yet freshly new to the ears. They also surrender to the essence of driving old time fiddle tunes: fast, shuffling, heavy foot stomping, and an unpenetrable groove. Described as the perfect cross section where the grit in sound is supported by their musicality and chops, you can expect the full range of temperament from **Amy Alvey** (fiddle, vocals) and **Mark Killanski** (guitar, vocals) in any given performance.

Stephen Sanfilippo

The Magnolia Street String Band started in 2013 as an informal project among some friends, meeting and pickin in Highland Park, NJ. Originally there was a cellist. And no banjo. Now, the group is composed of Paul Prestopino, Bobby Baxmeyer, Matthew Backes, Sheila Shukla, and Jonathan Austin, and played their first gig together in March 2014. In the year since they have played about thirty shows to ever larger and more appreciative audiences. Their music is grounded in traditional bluegrass with some folk, country, and old-time elements mixed in. Their take on bluegrass feels old but relevant, traditional but personal, well-crafted but ultimately soulful and direct.



The W.O.H.S. Jubilee Choir

The Antioch Choir is directed by Lamarr Hannah. He is a highly experienced and talented musician, with the ability to cast a musical spell over the audience. Lamarr is the Minister of Music for Antioch Christian church and also the musician for the Ministerial Alliance in New Brunswick NJ. He is a musically talented performer with strong vocals and outstanding musical skills. He writes, sings and produces his own music. Lamarr is passionate about music and has the natural ability to adjust own style to suit different music. Lamarr is a quick learner who is always open to learn new styles and has the ability to collaborate with other musicians. Graduating university at age 20, **Casey Buckley** faced what seemed to be an impossible pursuit: to fully develop as an artist amidst the harsh reality of student loans in an uncertain economy. Not one to be deterred by a challenge, he forged ahead on this dichotomous path. She then went on to receive a master's degree from Columbia Teachers College and to serve as the dean of Springfield College in Massachusetts.

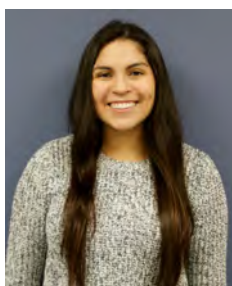

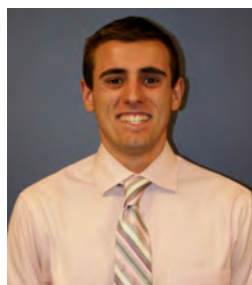
